Caring for Infants and Toddlers

Talking Sticks

In Native American culture, talking sticks were used to designate the speaker in a large meeting. Only the person with the stick could speak while everyone else listened. When the speaker finished, he would pass the stick to someone else. Each person decorated his talking stick with materials that he felt had symbolic meaning. Native Americans also used talking sticks when storytelling and performing ceremonies. Kids can make their own talking sticks from paper towel rolls, tissue paper, feathers and craft supplies.

Show children how to tape the feathers to one of the inside rims of the paper towel roll so the feathers stick out of the bottom. While they're working, explain that to Native Americans, a bird feather symbolizes spirit and flight. Different tribes believe different bird feathers have various meanings. An eagle feather represents high ideals and truth. A turkey feather symbolizes peace, while the owl feather prevented people from getting deceived.

Help children wrap a long length of tissue paper around the paper towel roll until it covers it and tuck in the ends. Fill the paper towel roll with dry beans or rice and plug the two ends with crumpled balls of construction paper and tape the ends. Decorate the stick with shapes, pictures and words. Some talking sticks were filled with noisemakers so the speaker could shake it for emphasis while talking or storytelling.

Team-Building for Staff

Build an Igloo-At your December staff meeting, separate employees into teams of four or five. Provide each team with a foil-covered piece of cardboard, a bag of marshmallows, a canister of icing and toothpicks. Challenge the team members to see who can build the best igloo in 15 minutes. Take pictures to hang on the bulletin board, so employees can remember how much fun they had all winter long. Allow them to eat the edible portions of their igloos as the meeting progresses.

Employee Trivia Game-Prior to your holiday party or December staff meeting, have employees email you a list of trivia facts about themselves. Aim for facts that they don't think many of their coworkers would be able to guess. Employees can list interesting previous jobs they might have held, unique college experiences, places they've traveled, etc. As it's going to be part of a holiday celebration, at least one piece of trivia per employee should pertain to a holiday or a wintertime experience.
